SIHLANGU'S JOURNEY AT THE HOLLYWOODBETS COSAFA 2025 TOURNAMENT

Sihlangu SeMnikati participated in the Hollywoodbets COSAFA 2025 Tournament, drawing inspiration from the country and showing determination in a tough Group C Campaign. Although the team missed out on progressing to the semifinals, there were notable highlights.



In our opening encounter, Eswatini held a fast-paced Madagascar side to a 1-1 draw. Midfielder Junior Magagula opened Eswatini's tournament goal tally with a well-placed finish from a dead ball situation just outside the box - -while left footed defender, Kwakhe Thwala was deservedly named Man of the Match for this match. He was unlucky not to score when his thunderous shot hit the crossbar.



In the decisive second match, Eswatini suffered a narrow 2-1 defeat at the expense of Tanzania; but once again, it was Junior Magagula who found the back of the net registering his second goal of the tournament, and for Eswatini.




These results were not enough for Eswatini to advance to the semifinals of the tournament as the national team was leapfrogged by Tanzania for the second position and Madagascar qualified for the knockout phase after finishing the group stages at the summit of Group C.

RISING STARS STEP INTO THE SPOTLIGHT

As the senior national team geared up for the Hollywoodbets COSAFA Cup 2025 in South Africa, two of Eswatini's brightest young prospects, Alakhe Mdluli and Thomas Morgan, received their first-ever senior national team call-ups, a proud and defining moment in their budding careers.

Plying their trade in South Africa and England, respectively, both players stood out as among the youngest members of the squad, adding youthful energy, international experience, and fresh potential to the national team setup. Their selection reflects the growing reach and caliber of Eswatini football talent across borders.



To mark the occasion, the EFA engaged the two in a short Q&A, capturing their thoughts, emotions, and ambitions as they took their first steps into the senior national team football.

HERE IS WHAT THEY HAD TO SAY:

Q1. How did you feel when you first found out you were called up to represent Eswatini?

Thomas Morgan (T.M): It was an incredible feeling. I felt proud and grateful. Representing country is my something l've dreamed of since I was a kid, and I'm still so young to finally get that call was emotional inspiring. and lt reminded me why l've worked so hard.

Alakhe Mdluli (A.M) : I was excited, at first I couldn't believe it

Q2. Where were you when you first got the news and what was your reaction?

T.M : I was in England when I found out. At first I just sat there in silence trying to take it in. Then I smiled and felt this huge wave of motivation. It felt like everything was starting to come together.

A.M : I was in the house on my bed, I was screaming and I started jumping around

Q3. Can you share a bit about your football journey so far where it started and where you are now?

T.M : I started playing football in Eswatini at Mbabane swallows and represented Eswatini at youth level, and from there my path took me to Europe where I joined Málaga. While at Málaga I played against some massive clubs which helped me gain recognition on the European stage. After that I moved to Kidderminster Harriers in England. During my time there I went on trial at Bradford City and Colchester City, and there was interest from Chelsea as well. Right now I'm playing men's football to build experience and mature my game. In the upcoming season my agent and I will be looking to move to a Premier League club or possibly abroad to other European teams as there is interest all round. Time will tell but I'm staying ready for the next step.

A.M : From what I can recall, I started playing in Ludzelundze since I grew up there. I played for a team called Zero Boyz u13(Kwakhe & Tiger were part of that team, we played together) then moved on the Siyadlala Academy where I met Tommy Morgan. After Siyadlala I joined Amazulu fc in Durban and that where I am currently.

Q4. What has been the biggest lessons from playing in [England/South Africa] so far?

T.M : Playing in England has taught me a lot about professionalism and discipline. The level of detail in training and match preparation is very high and the game is fast and physical. I've learned how important it is to take care of every aspect of my game both on and off the pitch.

A.M : Hard work can take you Far in life.

Q5. How different is football there compared to back home in Eswatini?

T.M: It's a big difference in terms of structure and intensity. In England everything is planned out from diet to recovery to analysis. In Eswatini there is so much raw talent but the systems and facilities aren't always the same. I carry that hunger from home with me wherever I play.

A.M : It's just the playing styles and tactical .

Q6. What's one challenge you've faced in your football career and how did you overcome it?

T. M: Leaving home at a young age was a huge challenge. Being away from my family and comfort zone forced me to grow up fast. I stayed focused on my goals kept a strong routine and leaned on my support system to get through the lonely moments.

A.M: I lacked confidence when playing, started doing more individual sessions.

Q7. Are there any senior players in the squad who've been like mentors to you already?

T.M : Yes a few of the senior players have taken me under their wing. Felix was the main person who I was with a lot learning from and if I was feeling pressure or anything I would speak to him about it, also Philani Mkhonto, Justice figareido, Pupu and also Junior Magagula were helping me out they give me advice during training and talk to me about the mental side of the game. Having them around has helped me feel more confident and settled in the squad.

Q8. What keeps you focused or motivated on difficult days?

T.M : My family my goals and my faith keep me going. I think about how far I've come and how much further I want to and can go. I also use tough days as fuel to keep improving. I know every challenge is part of the process.

A.M : I catch up with school work since I miss out on a alot of work due to football, that keeps me forced.

Q9. Do you have any pre-game rituals or habits before a match?

T.M : I usually listen to music and take a few quiet minutes to visualise the game. I also say a short prayer just to clear my mind and lock in mentally.

A.M : I just pray before every game.

Q10. What's one thing fans might not know about you?

T.M : What most people do not see is the emotional side of the journey. There have been moments where I genuinely felt like giving up. I have had trials that did not go my way and days where I was alone in a new country asking myself if all the sacrifices were worth it. I have felt the pressure of carrying expectations while silently battling doubt. But through every setback I kept going. What pushes me is not just the dream but the people behind me. My family has given up so much for me to chase this path. Every time I step on the pitch I am carrying their hopes and their sacrifices. Football is not just a game to me. It is everything. It is my purpose and my promise to those who believed in me when no one else did.

A.M : I love God.

Q11. What does it mean to you to wear the national team jersey?

T.M : It means everything to me. I don't take it for granted. Wearing the jersey is about representing my family my country and everyone who has supported me. It's something I carry with pride and responsibility and I would give everything on the pitch for this jersey.

A.M : Means alot and it feel like a dream came true cause I'm been dreaming about this since I started playing football.


Q12. Any message you'd like to send to young footballers in Eswatini who dream of reaching where you are now?

T.M : Believe in yourself and trust the process. No dream is too big if you're willing to work for it. Stay humble stay hungry and remember where you come from. I'm proof that even from a small country you can aim for the top while im not there yet I soon will.

A.M : Anything is possible, you just have to believe and work towards it.
